Transition to Practice: Regulatory considerations from CPSA

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


Land acknowledgement

Overview of CPSA

Health Professions Act (HPA)



- CPSA oversees physician self-regulation through the HPA
 - Operate independent of government, but are accountable to legislation
- We protect Albertans by guiding the medical profession
 - CPSA's Standards of Practice
 - CPSA Code of Conduct
 - o CMA's Code of Ethics and Professionalism

CPSA Council

- Sets CPSA's overall direction and policies
- Equal representation of elected physician members and appointed public members

Registration

Registration

- All physicians and physician assistants must have a valid practice permit to practise medicine
- CPSA registration is separate from AHS privileging
- Registers:
 - General: independent practice
 - o **Provisional**: independent practice, supervised practice
 - i.e., postgraduate trainees, physician extenders
 - Non-clinical: active practice permit but not engaged in any clinical work for at least six consecutive months
 - i.e., parental leave, full-time administrative work or full-time teaching

Applying for independent practice

- 1. Email from CPSA three months before your program ends
- 2. Create a physiciansapply.ca account
- 3. CPSA review of qualifications
- 4. Submit required documentation (including criminal record check)
- 5. Pay one time registration fee and annual fee, and receive your practice permit

Common questions

- What happens if I fail my exam?
 - If you obtain sponsorship and successfully complete a three-month supervised practice assessment, you may be eligible for the Provisional Register, Conditional Practice.
- When should I apply for an independent practice permit?
 - You should apply as soon as you receive your specialty certification, even if you are pursuing further (subspecialty) fellowship training.
- Is registration the same in every Canadian province?
 - Although there are commonalities, each province has its own registration requirements.
- Can I start working before I have my practice permit?
 - No, you cannot schedule your work until a permit has been obtained.


- Verify CPSA has your current email address
